I will always use good outdoor manners.


I will show respect to other club members.

Gordon Alan Billings






Born in Vancouver, schooled in Vancouver, worked in Vancouver (McBurney's Insurance Agency (Richmond)), retired to Campbell River. Married Jean Mclean, from one of Campbell River's pioneer families, the Mclean's. They have two children, Elizabeth and Alan. Elizabeth now oversees Gordon's care. Alan is Richmond's Fire Chief.

In the 1950s, Gordon took up competitive sailing of small sailboat class. He tried out for the Canadian Olympic team of that class in Toronto. Somebody else was chosen to represent Canada in the 1956 Olympics in Melbourne Australia.

Neighbors of Gordon's in laws, Myrtle and Bob Thompson inspired Gordon and Jean to become rockhounds. They joined the Richmond Gem and Mineral club in the 1980s before He and Jean retired to Campbell River in 1990. While in Richmond he was taught basic lapidary, silver smithing and faceting by instructors of the Mineral club. He was elected to executive positions within the Richmond club and the B C Lapidary Society before he and Jean moved to Campbell River.

While living in Richmond, Gordon and Jean became charter members of the Ripple Rock Gem and Mineral club. After they moved to Campbell River, Gordon was elected as our president for four years. He instructed members of the club in lapidary and faceting. He took university courses to learn how to identify rocks and minerals.

Before excessive maturity slowed he and Jean down, they attended many rock club functions throughout B C and most of these functions are still held annually. (Check the B C Lapidary website for dates and locations of the Rendezvous, Summer Camp, club rock shows, Island Faceters meetings, Gemboree, field trips, auctions, tail gate sales and) Rockhounding, vacationing and recreational trips took them North to Alaska and South to Tucson, Quartzite and other places in Utah, Arizona, and Nevada. Of
